With Israel temporarily set aside, God is now calling "out of the Gentiles" a people for His name to testify to a rejected but returning Christ, before working nationally with Israel again.	Prior to Calvary, God dwelt a single location at Jerusalem. Today He dwells wherever two or three are "gathered together unto His name" – i.e. under the authority, lordship and ownership of Christ alone. This foundational basic principle is our one and only "ground of gathering".	The precepts, principles and historical pattern of the NT provide a blueprint for assembly order and function today. They tell us "how to build" and "how to behave" in the house of God. Assembly principles are called the "commandments of the Lord".
